St Minver Community Hub

The St Minver Community Hub has been awarded a Shared Prosperity Fund grant of £600,000, which This brings the total funds raised and pledged to some £900,000. This will enable construction of the new Community Hub Building in Trewint Playing Fields to commence this year and to be in use by the end of 2024. This is a tremendous milestone for the project that was envisaged over 10 years ago and for which fund raising has been underway for 5 years.



The new building will not only provide the facilities to secure the future of the Scouts, Guides, Football Club and Health Hub but also provide a modern, fully accessible, energy efficient, space that will be at the heart of the St Minver Lowlands community (which includes Trebetherick).

Daymer Bay Community Interest Company (CIC)

Following the closure by Cornwall Council of the public toilets at Daymer Bay, the TRA agreed in 2016 to set up a community interest company to re-open them. After two years of negotiation, and alterations were made inside the building while new Propelair toilets were fitted to reduce water consumption, the CIC signed a lease with Cornwall Council, and the building re-opened on 1st April 2019. From then until now, a period of nearly five years, the toilets have remained open, apart from a few weeks during the outbreak of the Covid pandemic.

The CIC continues to face constant challenges such as, lack of finance, drains blocking due to misuse by the public, vandalism, some users avoiding payment,

repairs to the building fabric, and the increase in costs of consumer materials, cleaning, and waste removal. Consequently, the CIC is only able to continue to function with the generosity of financial contributions, both large and small, made by TRA members. Daymer Lane Problems

Several residents of Daymer Lane have complained about the Lane being narrowed by excessive ingrowth of hedges and trees. This makes walking down the narrow lane even more hazardous. The middle section of the lane is the worst affected and the problem is caused by residents who have not cut back their hedges and also self-seeded saplings on the verges. We notified St Minver Lowlands Parish Council and CC Highways Department about the problem 6 months ago but thus far, no action has been taken. Would all residents of Daymer Lane please ensure that their hedges or trees are not overhanging the Lane, and also report any other obstructions to the CC Highways Department
